Why We Need to Foster Moral Competence

- P Modern Moral Psychology confirms Socrates' observation: We do not need to impose *moral orientations* on people. They are inborn in all of us.
- P However our desire to act morally causes conflicts in us for which we need moral competence, that is, the ability to solve them through thinking and discussion.
- P If we lack moral competence, we must try to solve these conflicts through violence and deceit, or through submission to authorities. Eventually, we turn against freedom and democracy.
